	<p><u>Little Bee</u> by Chris Cleave – September 28th, 2011</p> <p>What if one just turned up on the other's doorstep one misty morning and asked, Can you help? And what if that help wasn't just a one-way street?" From the author of the international bestseller Incendiary, comes a haunting novel about the tenuous friendship that blooms between two disparate strangers---one an illegal Nigerian refugee, the other a recent widow from suburban London.</p>
	<p><u>Battle Hymn of the Tiger Mother</u> by Amy Chua – October 26th, 2011. A controversial account of a Chinese American mother's philosophy on raising children. Amy Chua, a Yale educated lawyer, provides insight into her child rearing style and her beliefs on the difference between North American parenting and Chinese parenting. Are sleep overs good? How much should a child practice? When is a child at an age where they could and should make their own decisions about how they spend their time.</p>
	<p><u>Bossy Pants</u> by Tina Fey and <u>Holiday Party!</u> – December 7th, 2011.</p> <p>Tina Fey reveals all, and proves what we've all suspected: you're no one until someone calls you bossy.</p> <p>Join us for our 1st annual Holiday Book Exchange. 	<p><u>Onward: How Starbucks Fought for Its Life without Losing Its Soul</u> by Howard Schultz – January 25th, 2011</p> <p>Offering readers a snapshot of a moment in history that left no company unscathed, the book zooms in to show, in riveting detail, how one company struggled and recreated itself in the midst of it all.</p>
	<p><u>Half Broke Horses: A True-Life Novel</u> by Jeannette Walls – February 22nd, 2012</p> <p>In Half Broke Horses, Jeannette Walls, author of The Glass Castle, brings us the story of her grandmother, told in a first-person voice that is authentic, irresistible, and triumphant. "Those old cows knew trouble was coming before we did." So begins the story of Lily Casey Smith, Jeannette Walls's no nonsense, resourceful, and spectacularly compelling grandmother.</p>
	<p><u>Follow the River</u> by James Alexander Thom – March 28th, 2012</p> <p>Mary Ingles was just twenty-three, married, and pregnant, when Shawnee Indians invaded her peaceful Virginia settlement, killed the men and women, then took her captive. For months, she lived with them, unbroken, until she escaped, and followed a thousand mile trail to freedom--an extraordinary story of a pioneer woman who risked her life to return to her people.</p>
	<p><u>Nine Parts of Desire</u> by Geraldine Brooks – April 25th, 2011.</p> <p>The story of Brooks intrepid journey toward an understanding of the Muslim women behind the veils, and of the often contradictory political, religious, and cultural forces that shape their lives.</p>
	<p><u>Doctor Zhivago</u> by Boris Pasternak – May 23rd, 2012</p> <p>Published in Italy in 1957 amid international controversy, the novel was banned in the Soviet Union until 1988. Pasternak declined the Nobel Prize in 1989 under pressure from Soviet authorities. <i>Doctor Zhivago</i> is the story of the life and loves of a poet-physician during the turmoil of the Russian Revolution. Taking his family from Moscow to what he hopes will be shelter in the Ural Mountains, Zhivago finds himself instead embroiled in the battle between the Whites and the Reds. Set against this backdrop of cruelty and strife is Zhivago's love for the tender and beautiful Lara: pursued, found, and lost again, Lara is the very embodiment of the pain and chaos of those cataclysmic times.</p>
